2012 Vacation Bible School July 30 - August 3 9:00 - Noon

Vacation Bible School begins on Monday, July 30 through Friday, August 3 (Please note the change in date from previous announcements.) Jennifer Ernst and Cynthia Pedersen are our Director and Assistant Director for this year's VBS. The theme is, "Clean Water for All God's Children." There will be classes for children, ages 4 through Grade 5. No pre-registration is required.

As part of our year-long emphasis on water, our Vacation Bible School will educate our children about the world's water crisis and what we can do to help. The children will learn what the scripture teaches us about water and our responsibility for the goodness of Creation and for the care of the physical health of others. The children will engage in Bible stories, mission projects, crafts, music and recreation while becoming more aware of the importance of water in our lives.



This year, the children and workers who participate in Vacation Bible School will be encouraged to bring a daily offering to help fund the purchase of a Clean Water Filtering System that will be installed in a community in the Appalachia region. As a congregation, we can all participate in this part of Vacation Bible School. Over the next few weeks and months, there will be large water jug in the Narthex that will give you an opportunity to contribute your loose coins. Once we raise enough money to purchase the filtering system, we will send someone to be trained to help with its installation.

Begin now to spread the word that Vacation Bible School is just a few weeks away and plan to support it with your generosity to the special offering.

Pastor's Ponderings

Now will you listen?

Last Sunday while talking with the children during worship, I had someone trying hard to get my attention. Little Nathan Gibson was trying to ask me something, but I was too busy telling the story of David from the Bible. Even his older brother, Matty, tried to get my attention, but I was on a roll.

Finally, when I had stopped speaking, Matty says, "Now will you listen?" And so I did. As it turns out,

Nathan asked me about my ankle.

Nathan: "Did you fall...did you fall on the rocks?"

Pastor Denise: "Yes, I fell and now it's broken. See the big bandage the doctors put on my ankle to help it get better?"

And that was it. We had our closing prayer and off he went to the nursery.

Meanwhile I felt pretty small. Oh, I know that sometimes children can take over, but in this instance Nathan wanted to ask about my ankle and I kept on with my agenda.

I used this story in the sermon a few minutes later because the sermon was about *listening*! I had made myself the perfect sermon illustration!

The past few weeks have given me lots of opportunities to think about how well we do with listening to one another. Mostly I've concluded that it's sort of

like the title of Michael Nichols' book, *The Lost Art of Listening*.

Maybe if we could slow down a little and not think so much about what we want to say, that we could actually listen to someone else. And it's not just



the spoken word. We don't "listen" very well in the written word department either. We text, email, face-book message, and we sort of scan what was sent and lose important facts and information because we don't take time to understand the

because we don't take time to understand the message.

And yes, there's a spiritual dimension to this as well. I often wonder how many times God has said to us, "Now will you listen?" And our response has been that we're too busy, too many family obligations, and just too much to do. We might even say we have too many church obligations.

Jesus uses a story to remind disciples about listening: "He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out...he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice." (John 10:3, 4) Are our listening skills so tuned that we hear voice of our Savior speaking to us?

Here's a summer project: Take time to listen to one another; take time to listen for God; and experience the joy of really "hearing." Maybe God is saying to us, "Now will you listen..."


