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October 7 - World Communion Sunday Celebration and Peacemaking Offering

On the first Sunday of October, we bring together two long-standing traditions. We join with sisters and brothers around the globe to celebrate the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. (This year we will receive the sacrament by



intinction - coming forward to receive the bread and then dipping it in the chalice.) It is always a special time to remember that we are part of the Church wherever it gathers to worship God and lift up Jesus as Lord and Savior.

As you enter the sanctuary on October 7, you will notice special adornments of the chancel area. We are using containers of every kind to symbolize those things that hold water. We can reflect on the peaceful role that water has on our lives. From the day that we were baptized and felt the waters of baptism until now when we experience the beauty of a trickling stream, a flowing river, or the sparkling ocean, there is a peace that water brings to our spirit.

We also receive one of our denominational offerings. The Peacemaking Offering supports the peacemaking efforts of the church at every council level and provides an opportunity to witness to God's gift of peace in the world. The gifts are divided in the following manner - twenty-five percent retained by congregations for support of their own peacemaking ministry; 25 percent used to support presbytery peacemaking efforts; and 50 percent forwarded to the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program of the General Assembly.

Pastor's Ponderings

Abundant Joy, Overflowing Generosity

The theme for the 2012 Commitment emphasis is: *Abundant Joy, Overflowing Generosity*.

Think about it – the Bible is about abundance. Theologian Walter Bruggemann says: “From the first chapters of Genesis, God not only initiates abundance – calling forth plants and fish and birds and animals – but promises continued abundance by commanding them to increase and multiply (v. 22)” Then God declares all this ‘very good’ (vv. 30-31).”

The abundant generosity of God - the examples are too numerous to count. Let’s consider just two:

In the Old Testament at the time of the exodus - the Israelites left the land of scarcity immediately anticipating the land of abundance. Instead, they find themselves at risk in a wilderness, a place of scarcity where even bread seems an impossibility. There are murmurs and complaints. Then, in this desert wilderness, bread inexplicably appears. A fine, flaky substance comes down - a demonstration of God’s faithful generosity.

Then in the New Testament, Jesus knows all about the generosity and faithfulness of God. Filled with God’s generosity, Jesus went around to people suffering from scarcity – of health, of acceptance, of power, of understanding – and replaced it with a gift of abundance.

In the eighth chapter of Mark’s Gospel there is the second feeding story. Jesus is moved “to compas-

sion” – a Greek term that means that his insides are turned over. He cares about the hungry and knows something must be done. To the disciples Jesus points out the need: “they have nothing to eat” (8:2). Perhaps he’s hoping his disciples will remember the last time this happened, and start looking around for a few loaves and fishes. But their minds are still stuck on scarcity: “How can you feed these people with bread in the desert?” (v. 4). You can sense the resistance in the disciples’ question. It’s the resistance of pragmatism, of efficiency, of “the real world.” The words are “how can you?” but they’re really saying “You can’t.” “It won’t work.” “Get real.” These are not generous words; these are not words that arise from abundance. However, Jesus has abundance on his mind, so he refuses to even answer their question. Instead he moves on, asking a question of his own: “How many loaves do you have?” (8:5). They answer: “Seven.” It is enough.

Again and again we are reminded that it is enough. Ponder anew these stories from scripture. Think about the *abundance* God has provided in your life.

Church-Wide Water Emphasis Continues


Lots of opportunities have been provided for us to think about the restoring power of water in our lives. Special thanks to Lloyd Parcell for the model in the narthex of a clean water filtering system. Lloyd helped the Sunday School classes put this model together at our Rally Day.

Upcoming activities:

On Sunday, October 7, there will be a special display of unique pitchers and vases in our worship service. If you have earthen pottery or crystal pitchers as well as wooden or porcelain implements, we invite you to share them with us. Bring these to church on Sunday, September 30 and leave them in the narthex.

On Sunday, October 14, the Congregational Care Committee will be hosting an after-church luncheon with special presentations by Lee Brown and Cindy Mabry from First Presbyterian Church, Richmond and Margaret Thompson and Cindy Reid from OPC. Lee and Cindy have been a part of Living Waters for the World and will have just returned from an installation of a clean water filtering system. Margaret Thompson also has a first-hand experience to share about the need for water around the world. Cindy will give us a glimpse at the needs in our own community.

In terms of our Church-wide Clean Water Fund-Raiser, as of September 22, we have collected \$1,944. The balance needed to purchase a clean water filtering system is \$556. Let's see if we can collect that amount by Sunday, October 14! Checks in the offering should be marked in the memo section, "Clean Water Fund." Water Works

Fall is a wonderful time to work outside and there are plenty of opportunities outdoors to save on water usage. Pick an idea or project that appeals to you and start there. Every little change makes a big difference in the long run. Most of all, have fun!



- Use a trigger nozzle on your garden hose so you can turn the water on and off easily.
- It's generally best to water lawns and flowerbeds in the early morning and late evening because large amounts of water can be lost due to evaporation during the heat of the day.
- Raise your lawn mower blade. Longer grass promotes deeper root growth, resulting in a more drought-resistant lawn, reduced evaporation, and fewer weeds.
- Reduce the number of times you fertilize your lawn per year. Once per year is usually sufficient. This will reduce grass growth which means less mowing, plus reduce the amount of chemicals that seep into our water system.
- Consider reducing the amount of insecticides used on your lawn. This also will reduce the chemicals in the water runoff. Plus, you will see more birds in your yard.
- Decrease the amount of lawn you have by adding a low maintenance flower meadow or drought resistant shrubs and groundcover.
- Consider planting drought-tolerant native plants, for which rainfall is usually enough.
- Add compost or mulch around trees and shrubs to reduce evaporation and weed growth.
- Use a drip irrigation system instead of sprinklers for your garden. The water is directed to the roots and is most effective.
- Direct a downspout to an area of your yard and create a rain garden.
- Go to <http://www.raingardennetwork.com> for more information on rain gardens.
- Sweep driveways, sidewalks, and steps rather than hosing them off.
- Cover pools and hot tubs to prevent evaporation.
- Collect rainwater from your roof, shed, garage or carport in a rain barrel or buckets. Use this water to water your plants.

Note – the average roof collects about 22,500 gallons of water per year. That is enough water to fill 450 50 gallon rain barrels.




Reformation Sunday Worship - October 28
